	If you <b>don't stop</b> ,	we <b>will leave</b> .	Bedingung <b>erfüllbar</b>
II	<b>simple past</b>	<b>would + infinitive</b>	
	If we <b>played</b> tennis,	I <b>would win</b> .	Bedingung <b>theoretisch erfüllbar</b>
III	<b>past perfect</b>	<b>would + have/has + infinitive</b>	
	If I <b>had learned</b> more,	I <b>would have passed</b> .	Bedingung <b>nicht mehr erfüllbar</b> (Es ist zu spät.)
